

An international semester programme (30 ECT) English taught, future proof educative approach and innovative oriented.











Course Focus

The course explores the concept of urbanization and the challenges this poses to the social work profession. The diversity of Ghent will be explored through observations, environmental screenings, field visits and lectures from practice based guest teachers.





Key Concepts

The theory focuses on four key concepts:

- → Urbanisation
- Migration
- Globalisation
- Diversity

These key concepts will be linked to social work practice and to methods within community work, empowerment approaches as well as human rights and ethical challenges.

Critical Thinking

Critical reflection is a generic aspect of the course in order to enhance critical thinking in problem solving as well as in social interventions. In order to strengthen your learning and train for practice, you will work on written assignments – individually as well as in groups.

Programme

The semester is divided into 6 loops, each of 3 weeks duration ended by a reflection day. The last two weeks of the program is an assessment period.

- → Loop 1 (week 1-3): Making sense of the city
- → Loop 2 (week 4-6): Discovering Challenges in Urban Areas
- → Loop 3 (week 7-9): Ethics, Empowerment, and Critical Thinking
- → Loop 4 (week 10-12): Facing Superdiversity
- → Loop 5 (week 13-15): Exploring Community Based Development
- → Loop 6 (week 16-18):
 Rethinking Urban Social Work (Project work)

Learning targets

The student demonstrates knowledge of:

- → Globalisation processes including migration patterns effecting social work.
- → European welfare systems in a comparative perspective.
- → Urban areas with social and cultural diversity.
- → Social problems and living conditions in urban areas (segregation, unemployment, poverty and processes of exclusion, stigmatisation, radicalisation).
- → Social interventions and methods directed at group and society levels.
- → The professional code of ethics for social work.
- Identification of issues, project design and academic methods.

The student demonstrates ability to:

- → Identify and analyse social issues and suggest relevant interventions.
- Search for, process and analyse information from a variety of sources.
- → Plan and complete course work and preparing and carrying out a project plan within the established time frame.
- → Apply social work methods to concrete cases.
- Communicate and establish professional relations with clients and other stakeholders.

The student demonstrates competences to:

- → Participate in group work and interact constructively with fellow students, clients and other stakeholders regardless of social and cultural background.
- → Apply knowledge of social problems, interventions and methods in practical situations.
- Undertake basic research applying academic skills and methods.
- → Evaluate the quality of work produced.
- → Find creative and innovative solutions to identified social needs and problems.



FUTURE SOCIAL WORKERS IN URBAN AREAS

Globalisation and urbanisation have far reaching consequences. More than 50% of the European population lives in urban areas, a number that will increase to 75% by 2050. Factors such as migration, economic recession and increasing inequalities are changing our cities. The city is involved in global processes but also has impact on local decision-making processes that influence the life of citizens. This context challenges social workers who experience limits and constraints on influencing the situation.

Social workers are key stakeholders in the process of organising in a multi-voiced world in order to maximise the voice of the vulnerable and marginalised citizens and communities in any city. They promote the 'right to the city' for all. This programme offers perspectives and tools on how social work can link the Global Agenda to an urban context and thereby motivate future social workers to envision the type of city we need.
